A new place to call home

Long established local charity, the Isle of Sheppey Mencap, has announced that it will be merging with East Kent Mencap.

Following the sad death of their Chairman, Mr Ken Shaw, who made such a valuable contribution to people with learning disabilities on the island, Trustees made the decision to find a suitable organisation to merge with to ensure the existing good works continued.

Jason Gerlack
said: 'This is a fantastic
opportunity for people with a
learning disability and their families in
Sheppey. The substantial assets
bestowed on the charity will enable us to
invest in new and exciting activities that
will honour the legacy of the Isle of
Sheppey Mencap and provide much
needed local services. We have already
consulted with people about what they
would like to see happen and we are
developing four new flats.'

Trustee,
Mr Alan Shaw,
commented: 'Having worked
with East Kent Mencap in
the past, we knew they shared
similar aims and objectives.
After several meetings with the Chief
Executive, Mr Jason Gerlack, we were
reassured that the
charity will carry on the work
we spent many years
establishing.'

School's success

Foreland Fields School in Ramsgate has been awarded the United Nations **International Children's Emergency Fund** (UNICEF) Rights Respecting School GOLD Award. UNICEF's vision is 'a world where the rights of every child are realised'. This is the highest stage of the Rights Respecting Schools Award which is granted by Unicef UK to schools that have fully embedded children's rights throughout the school in its policies, practice and ethos. Foreland Fields is the first Kent LEA special school to achieve the Gold Award and the second Kent LEA school (all schools) to be awarded it. Foreland Fields School has worked with East Kent Mencap in connection with Kent County Council's 'Valuing People Now' initiative which involved their sixth form pupils sharing their views with the wider community and giving a presentation to the Kent Partnership Group. The Headteacher, Adrian Mount, said: 'I am extremely proud of all staff and pupils who supported us in our bid for Gold Award status.' 3



We're expanding!

We have some very exciting news to share! We've finally completed the purchase of Foresters Hall in Ramsgate after Thanet District Council agreed to sell the property through a Community Asset Transfer.



Foresters Hall, which includes a listed building from 1811, as well as other properties, will provide us with much needed space to expand its services for people with a learning disability and their families.

CEO, Jason Gerlack said, 'We have experienced a growing demand for our services and were bursting at the seams in our current offices.

The new site offers so much potential and we plan to develop a venue that is modern and light, offering state of art resources for people with a learning disability, their families and carers as well as volunteers and staff, and the local community.

Foresters Hall has been a community venue for over 200 years but it has been neglected in recent years and now looks shabby and unwelcoming. We want to bring it back to its former glory through a programme of refurbishment. It will not be a quick fix and we are approaching people and organisations to ask for their help with the restoration.

The initial response has been very positive, and we are already in talks with Ramsgate Heritage Action Zone Team about involving the local community.' Melanie and Sarah, who take part in activities, said they were excited to have more space for activities and to display their arts and crafts.

Another member, Jamie, commented that there would now be room for parties and discos.

The Mayor of Ramsgate,
Councillor Trevor Shonk, who is a
great supporter of our work,
responded saying, 'This is a much
needed service and all at East Kent
Mencap should be really proud of
achieving the purchase of Foresters
Hall which will be a great asset to
the local area.'

Over the next 12 months, we will be running a series of community events and activities, based at Foresters Hall to raise funds for the project and invite feedback.



Meet Adika

'I am a social work student from Canterbury Christ Church University in my second year of study. As part of my degree I have to complete a seventy day work placement within the local community, which I am currently undertaking with the **Getting On with Learning Difficulties Project** in Thanet.

Before I started my placement I was quite nervous as I had not worked with adults with a learning disability before, so I didn't know what to expect. Since being on placement I am really enjoying my time here. It's honestly such a heart-warming feeling to be able to support and empower individuals to become independent.

Individuals with a learning disability are often discriminated against, marginalised and isolated within society due to stigma. This can affect people's self confidence and the way they perceive themselves which can make them vulnerable.

Overall, I am looking forward to the rest of my time with the project and seeing what the future holds for GOLD and its members.'

New group for men

The Getting On with Learning Difficulties Project have launched a new social group, exclusively for men.

Following the success of the Women's Group, project worker, Simon Handley asked the men who regularly attend GOLD their thoughts on starting their own group. The group provides a safe place for men with a learning difficulty to meet up and talk about things that are important to them.

So far the group have met three times and have covered topics like relationships, hate and mate crime and how they could recruit more members to join them. The topic of relationships has proven to be something that men are keen to talk about, such as the difficulty of trying to meet new people and how sad it is when relationships go wrong.



Members of the group spoke to us about what it means to them:

Ben said: 'It is good because men can talk about things with other men and it gives men with learning disabilities a voice.'

David said: 'Men's Group is alright, I hope it carries on.'

The group welcomes any local men with a learning difficulty to come along and join them on the second Monday of each month. 

The group travelled by coach across the Eurotunnel and stayed in Belgium for a night before continuing their journey. They visited Bonn Market on the way to their hotel in Germany which sold lots of handmade gifts. The group stayed in the Valleys of Rüdesheim am Rhein in a traditional small hotel. During their stay they visited the markets of Wiesbaden. On the journey back home, the group visited Koblenz market and stayed in France overnight before returning back to the UK the next morning.

Alison said: 'I really enjoyed myself and liked looking at all the different things that people had made. I trying a Currywurst for the first time and liked it. I would love to visit different markets.'

Muriel said: 'I had a lovely time and had a laugh, we had nice food.'



Staying safe online

In January, Kent Police hosted an Internet Safety Workshop for people with a learning disability at our Herne Bay Resource Centre. The workshop covered social media, online scams and briefly touched on personal safety at the request of the attendees. Local Vulnerable Adult Intervention Officer, PCSO Dan Mimran led the workshop alongside his colleague, PCSO Matt Farley.

PCSO Dan kick started the workshop by asking the group how we know when people are our friends. He stressed how easy it is for strangers to connect with you online at the click of a button and this is why we should only accept or send friend requests to people we consider friends in real life. The workshop also discussed how Facebook should not be used as a dating site to try and make new friends or start new relationships. If you're using the internet to look for a relationship there are a number of regulated online dating agencies that can be looked into, but also consider looking for local social groups to meet new people.

PCSO's Dan and Matt advised the group that it is important to only post things online that they would say in real life to people. He discussed what we should do if people are saying inappropriate things to us online which include; telling a carer, blocking the person or if appropriate clicking the child exploitation online protection command. Child Exploitation and Online Protection is a law enforcement agency designed to keep children and young people safe from sexual abuse and grooming online. If you are in a situation where you need to report something

you can find this button online.



The workshop went on to discuss email phishing scams and the group were advised to delete any suspicious emails that requested money or personal details. Paul Pinder, who attended the workshop said: 'It was good because I had a question to ask them about the risks of Facebook and they answered it.'

PCSO Dan Mimran commented: 'It is important to help and support people with learning disabilities, autism or mental health issues as they can be some of the most vulnerable in our society as they can be the most trusting. My talks and workshops are not designed to scare people into never trusting anyone again, but to help educate them in a way they can understand to keep themselves safe. It is designed to empower people to say, 'No I don't have to accept this abuse'. It helps people to acknowledge who and how to ask for help. The key message is always, if you don't tell anyone then nothing will change and by telling someone who can help, change will happen for the better.

We all have our difficulties in life when we find it hard to say something or tell someone or even recognise we need help. For people with a learning disability, this challenge can be even greater, so it is my job to be a part of that process alongside organisations like East Kent Mencap, to help empower, give confidence and educate people on how to keep themselves safe.'

he planned interactive tasks for the cubs
to complete which included learning to
sign their name in Makaton and a blind
taste test.
